

# Handking anger

## Aim

To look at anger and some possible ways to dea! with it.

#### Intro

Prior to the meeting, arrange for 2 members of the group to have a heated argument as they sit in their seats.

Then calm them down, and introduce the study by reading Proverbs 14:29.

"If you stay calm you are wise, but if you have a hot temper, you only show how stupid you are."

### Group Work

Ask the group to divide up into groups of two/three and put together a typical 'angry' scene with which they are familiar. Keep the skit to no more than 60 seconds.

### Discussion

After the skits, spend some time discussing each of the following points about a Christian response to anger.

\*God created anger, so do not despise the emotion. God gets angry at evil, injustice etc. Read Jesus' anger...Mark 3:1-6.

\*Be angry but do not sin - it's not sinful to be angry with a situation, but that anger must not be nursed and allowed to 'grow' into hatred and bitterness. Read Ephesians 4:26,27.

\*Be slow in responding - our natural reaction is often selfish and not for good. Count to ten before replying?! Read James 1:19-21.

#### Brainstorm

Discuss ways to deal with anger in the future...without immediately exploding or holding it in which would lead to resentment. Collect all suggestions offered.

Possible ideas might be......

- (A) admit your anger to yourself and God.
- (B) reflect on why that event/situation made you feel anger.
- (C) pray.
- (D) share your feelings with another person who may be able to help.

### Re-play

Divide back into drama groups and get each one to work on a re-enactment of their initial skit, using an idea from the discussion as a basis. Report back in words or a new drama.

### Pray

Pray thanking God for His character, and pray that each of you will be continually transformed to be in His image - in the words of Psalm 103:8.

"The Lord is merciful and loving, slow to become angry and full of constant love."
